

September 2012 Strategic Plan Adopted

The Islands Trust Council has now adopted its Strategic Plan for the 2011- 2014 term of office. Some key objectives of the plan include: protecting coastal and marine ecosystems; enhancing community economic sustainability; and strengthening our relationships with First Nations. We will be working on issues related to those objectives and as always, we will be inviting the community to participate in a number of ways and help to inform our progress.

Shoreline Stewardship

Pender Island is well known for its spectacular waterfront, from the hidden coves, mud flats rocky and sandy beaches to the coastal bluffs and steep cliffs. Our waterfront and marine areas are of high importance and among the most valued of the natural attributes that make up our island. The Local Trust Committee has identified shoreline stewardship as a top priority on its Work Program and a number of initiatives are being planned to help us all learn more about the ecological, recreational and cultural values that all converge on our shorelines.

Economic Development Commission

Thanks to the work of our current CRD Director Dave Howe, North Pender is now the home of the Southern Gulf Islands Economic Development Commission. The commission consists of representatives from the Southern Gulf Islands. The strategic plan identifies "creating linkages with regional districts to foster economic sustainability" as a key activity. We look forward to working with closely with the new commission.

Joint LTC Meeting on October 4th

For the first time in our history, the North and South Pender Local Trust Committees will be having a joint meeting to share information and discuss common concerns. The meeting will be held on Thursday October 4th, beginning at 10 am, upstairs at the Pender Islands Community Hall. The main item on the agenda will be to meet the three principal contractors who prepared the Trust Area Shoreline Mapping. The project manager, a marine biologist and a marine geologist will be there to present the draft mapping to the trustees, and explain the methodology and terminology, along with the various shoreline classifications that are used in the maps. As well as the Pender trustees, trustees from other islands have been invited to attend as well.

Electric Dreams

Both the North and South Island Local Trust Committees have submitted formal requests to the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure asking that Pender roads be assessed for use by Neighbourhood Zero Emission Vehicles (NZEVs). The ministry's assessment will determine which roads can be used by these smaller, more compact and affordable battery-powered electric vehicles.

2012 Community Stewardship Award

The annual Islands Trust Community Stewardship Awards recognize individuals for actions that have made a significant contribution towards the community, culture or environment of the Islands Trust. Congratulations to Pender Island resident and lawyer Margot Venton for her work on protecting the Orca whale population. Margot's perseverance lead to a precedent-setting legal victory to help ensure the continued survival of threatened Orca whales.
