Open letter addressed to the Lasqueti Island Local Trust Committee and Regional representative

October 13, 2017

This letter is meant to voice our adamant rejection of the proposed development Marine Shoreline Protection Project.

I recently attended the meeting held on Lasqueti Island on October 6<sup>th</sup>. I went under the pretense that this would be discussed. The original agenda (attached) stated it would run from 6:30 to 8:30. We showed up on time and were extremely surprised by the amount of data pertaining to aboriginal affairs.

The meeting started at 7:00. We were told by the meeting chair how to address our speech to the guest speakers, ie not offend them with remarks that could be considered rude. I take offense at that. I do not need to be educated in how I address my remarks. I am a card carrying "indigenous" person (Karen). I did not need to attend a meeting that carried on for two hours about native history. I was outraged that we spent two hours at a meeting that was to address a proposed development zoning concern about marine shoreline protection and instead had two hours of aboriginal history rammed down our throats. Not once was the marine shoreline project brought up in the two hours we attended. We left the meeting at 8:30. The two guest speakers ran way past their allotted time leaving no time to address the real concern we came to talk about. My time is important to me, I do not like attending meetings and this will be the last. My opinions will be in letter form from here on as the local trust don't seem to be able to run a scheduled meeting properly. I understand from others that attended that there was little opportunity given to the locals who attended to reply to the issue at hand but a proposal to scrap the project was unanimously agreed to.

As a tax payer I am also outraged at the amount of money spent by the local trust promoting the aboriginal issue. As mentioned I am card carrying so this is not coming as a racist or disrespectful comment. This is not the agenda platform for the trust. They had no business dragging unsuspecting citizens to a meeting for this purpose.

My vote is to throw out the proposal.
