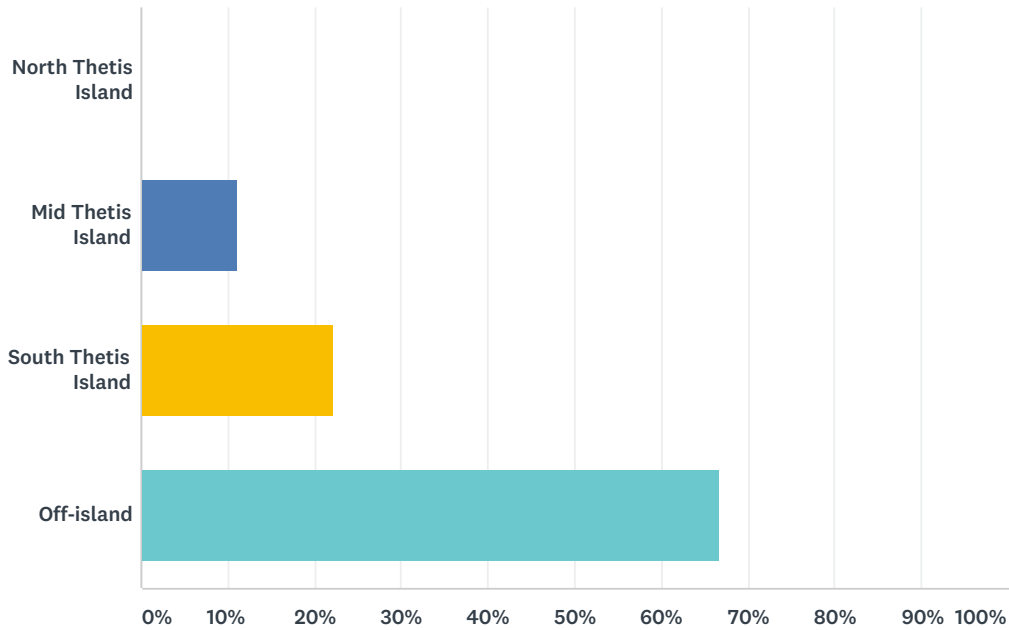


Q1 Where do you live?

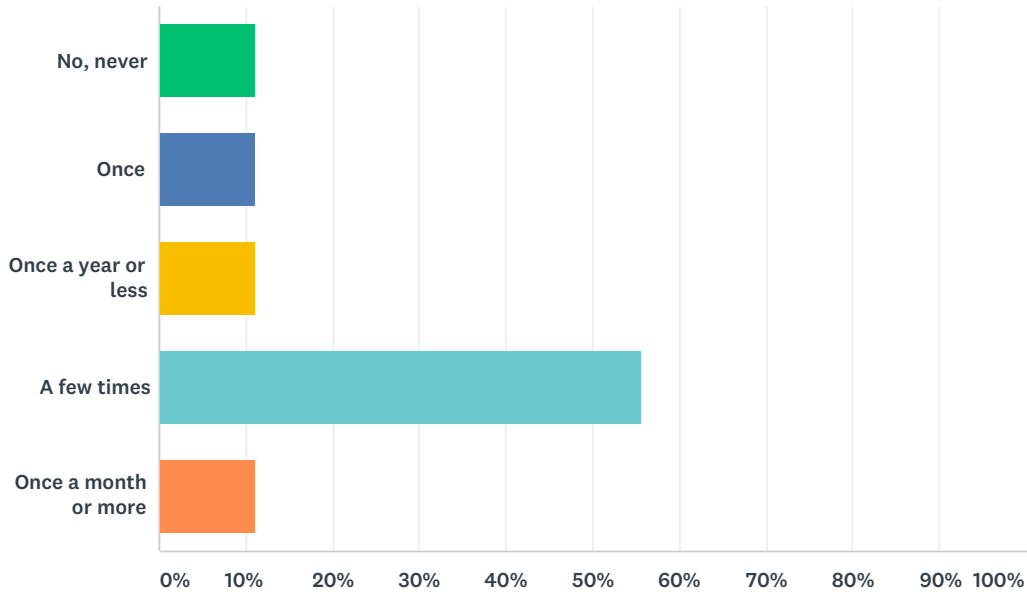

Q2 Have you ever visited Fairyslipper Forest Nature Reserve? If so, how often?

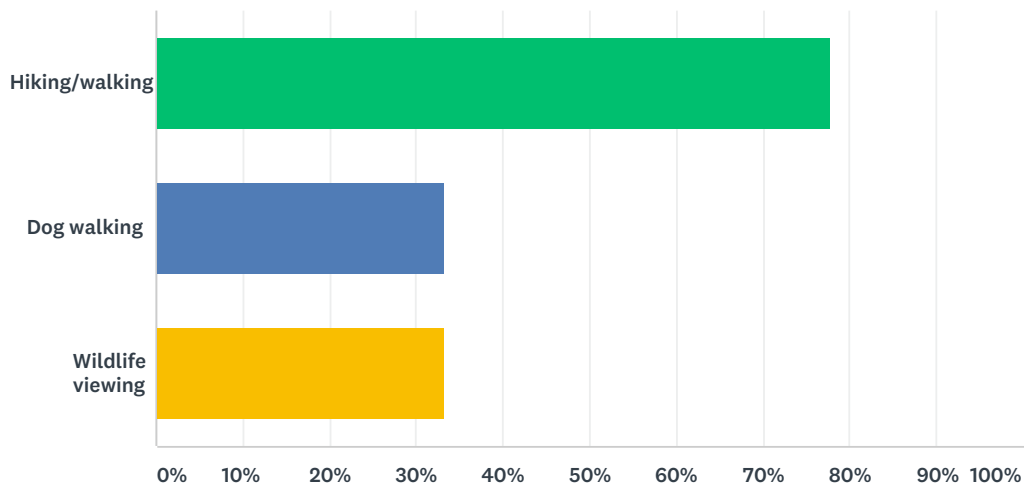

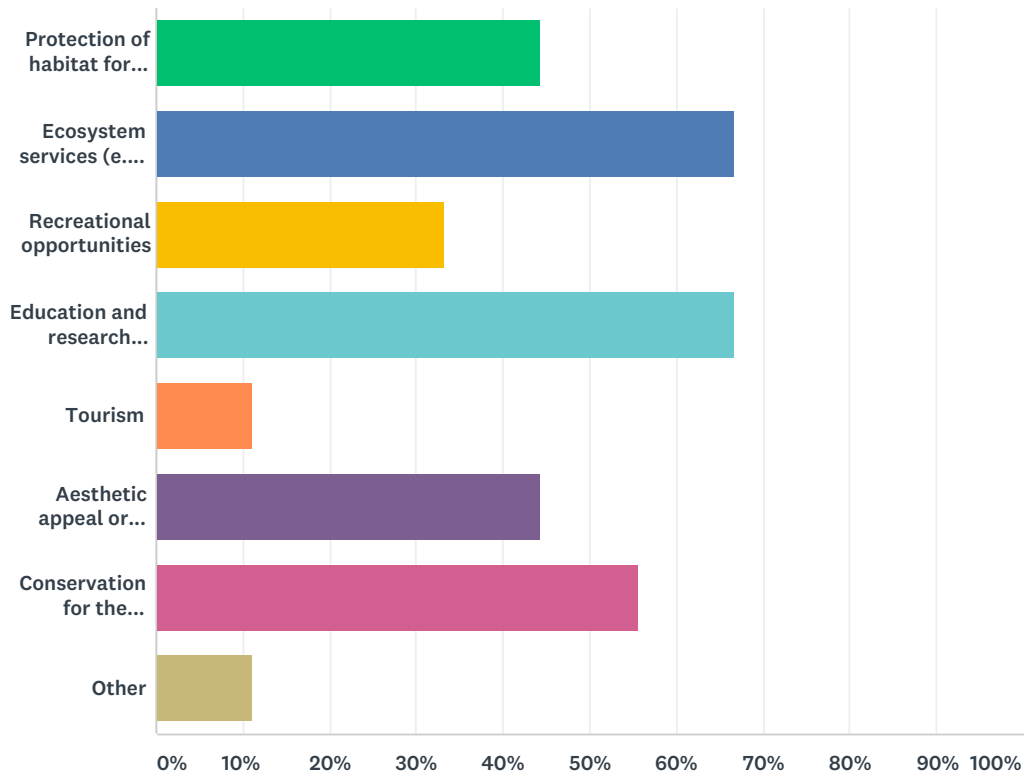
